OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an update of Re:Imagine Garden Grove efforts.

BACKGROUND

With the success of the giant Adirondack chairs at Civic Center Park, the recent Active Transportation grants and bikeway improvement projects now underway, there is continued momentum to identify innovative "Placemaking" opportunities in which Garden Grove celebrates its rich heritage and enhances public spaces – two goals of the Re:Imagine Garden Grove campaign. Most recently, the 2017 Annual Report on the status of the General Plan highlighted several activities associated with the Re:Imagine Garden Grove effort, including:

- Hosting of the 3rd Open Streets event on April 1, 2017;
- Approval of property disposition associated with Cottage Industries;
- Approval of a ground lease with SteelCraft Garden Grove;
- Preparation of a Downtown Parking Management Strategic Plan;
- Installation of giant Adirondack chairs in Civic Center Park;
- Preparation of the Garden Grove Active Streets Master Plan;
- Development of the OC Streetcar Project/Bike Trailer Program;
- Preparation of a Parks, Recreation, and Facilities Master Plan;
- Installation of a temporary Parklet along Main Street;
- Addition of music festivals in Village Green Park; and,
- Addition of Amphitheater live entertainment performances.

DISCUSSION

There is ongoing collaboration between Community and Economic Development and Community Services Departments to promote ideas and future programming of the Re:Imagine Garden Grove campaign in FY 2018-2019.

Enhancing Public Spaces (Park Furniture)

To encourage lively and attractive gathering places in public areas, the addition of quality seating, shade, art, lighting, and other interesting pedestrian amenities in public parks is highly recommended, as parks provide places for people to interact in a shared environment.

Inspiring with Public Art (Mural Art)

There has been significant positive feedback about the community's enjoyment and frequent usage of the ten colorful Adirondack chairs recently placed around the civic center area, along with the installation of the two giant Adirondack chairs at the Civic Center Park in Spring 2017. They both represent a positive improvement toward the goal of "Placemaking." In furthering Re:Imagine Garden Grove efforts, it is recommended that additional park furniture and mural art in the parks, and around the Downtown, including Village Green Park, be installed to bring inspirational art to public spaces.

Connecting through Storytelling (New Website)

With the possible postponement of a 4th Open Streets event to FY 2019-20, continuing a 'discovery and storytelling' effort for the Downtown area is an essential component in connecting the community to public places. To this end, the Information Technology Department and the Office of Community Relations will coordinate the creation of a Re:Imagine website that will explain the evolution of Re:Imagine Downtown to Re:Imagine Garden Grove. The website will incorporate information on past and upcoming activities and events, including links to our social media and marketing sites, as well as encourage the public to share their thoughts, ideas, and visuals of what they would like to see and experience in the future.

FINANCIAL

Funding for implementation of the General Plan measures, including the Re:Imagine Garden Grove campaign, is obtained from three sources: the General Plan cost recovery fee, the Cultural Arts fee, and the Art in Public Places fee, all of which are taken from a portion of building permit costs.

No additional funding is required. There is no impact to the City's General Fund.





SUBJECT: Monthly Water Usage Data, Tier 2 Projection & Water Supply Information

The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply OCWD Groundwater was the main supply in May.
- OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years Water usage in May 2018 was slightly below average compared to the last 5 years. We are seeing a slight increase in overall water usage compared to the previous two Fiscal Years. In June 2016, all water conservation became voluntary for MWDOC agencies and the Great California Drought was declared over by the Governor in April 2017.
- Historical OC Water Consumption OC water consumption is projected to be 533,000 AF in FY 2017-18 (*this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage*). This is about 14,000 AF more than FY 2016-17 and is about 42,000 AF more than FY 2015-16 (During the SWRCB mandatory water restrictions). Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher than in FY 2017-18 for Orange County at 149 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts

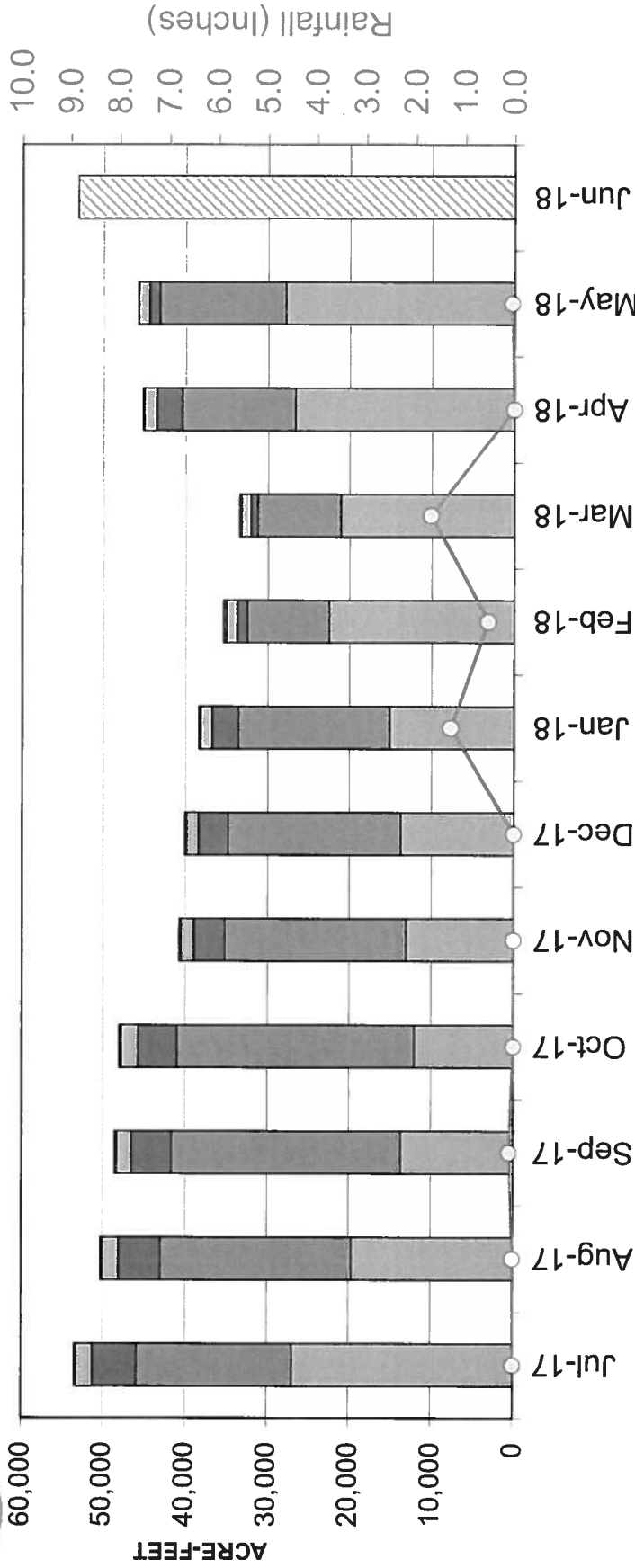
Water Supply Information Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.

- Orange County's accumulated rainfall through late June was well below average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 3.66 inches which is 29% of normal.

- Northern California accumulated precipitation through late June was around 84% of normal for this period. Water Year 2017 was the wettest water year on record. The Northern California snowpack was 43% of normal as of April 1st. The State of California was in a declared Drought Emergency that started January 2014 and ended in April of 2017. As of late June, 37.1% of California is experiencing moderate or severe drought conditions while 69.6% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation has increased to 35% as of late May.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through late June was 72% average for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 71% of normal as of April 3. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 60% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 45.0% of their total capacity. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of late June, Lake Mead levels were 3.2' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the start of 2019 will not hit the "trigger" level but there is a 52% chance that the trigger level will be hit in 2020 and a 62% chance in 2021.



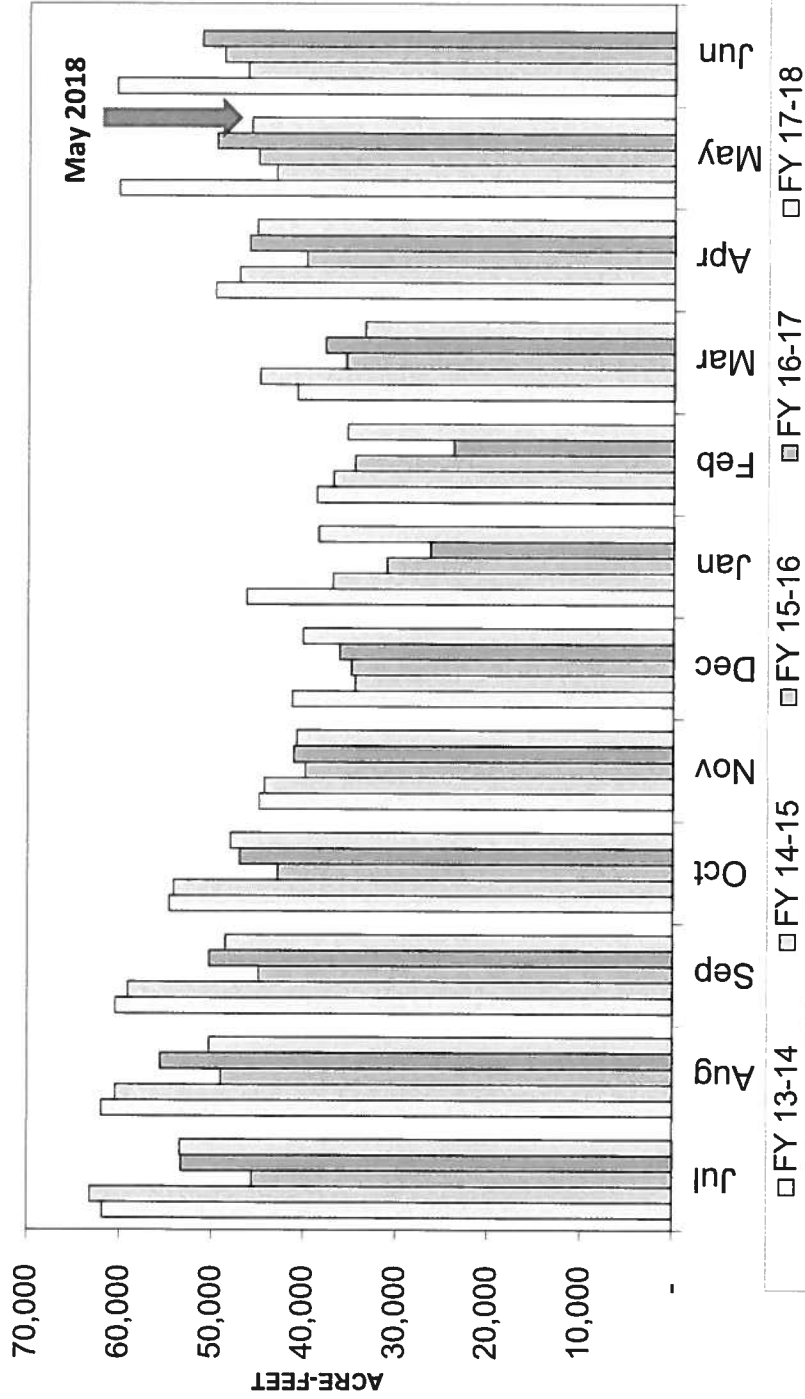
**Fig. 1 OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply
with projection to end of fiscal year**



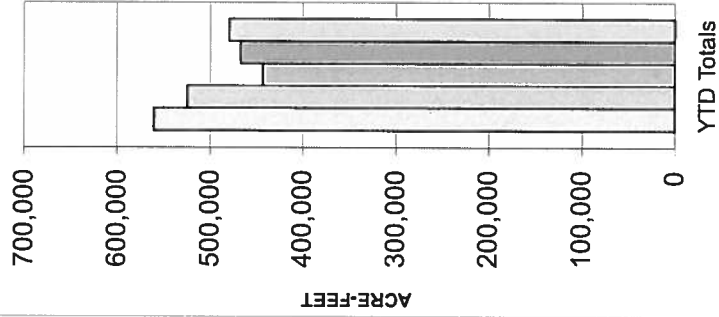

Fig. 2 OC Monthly Water Usage [1]: Comparison to Last 4 Fiscal Years

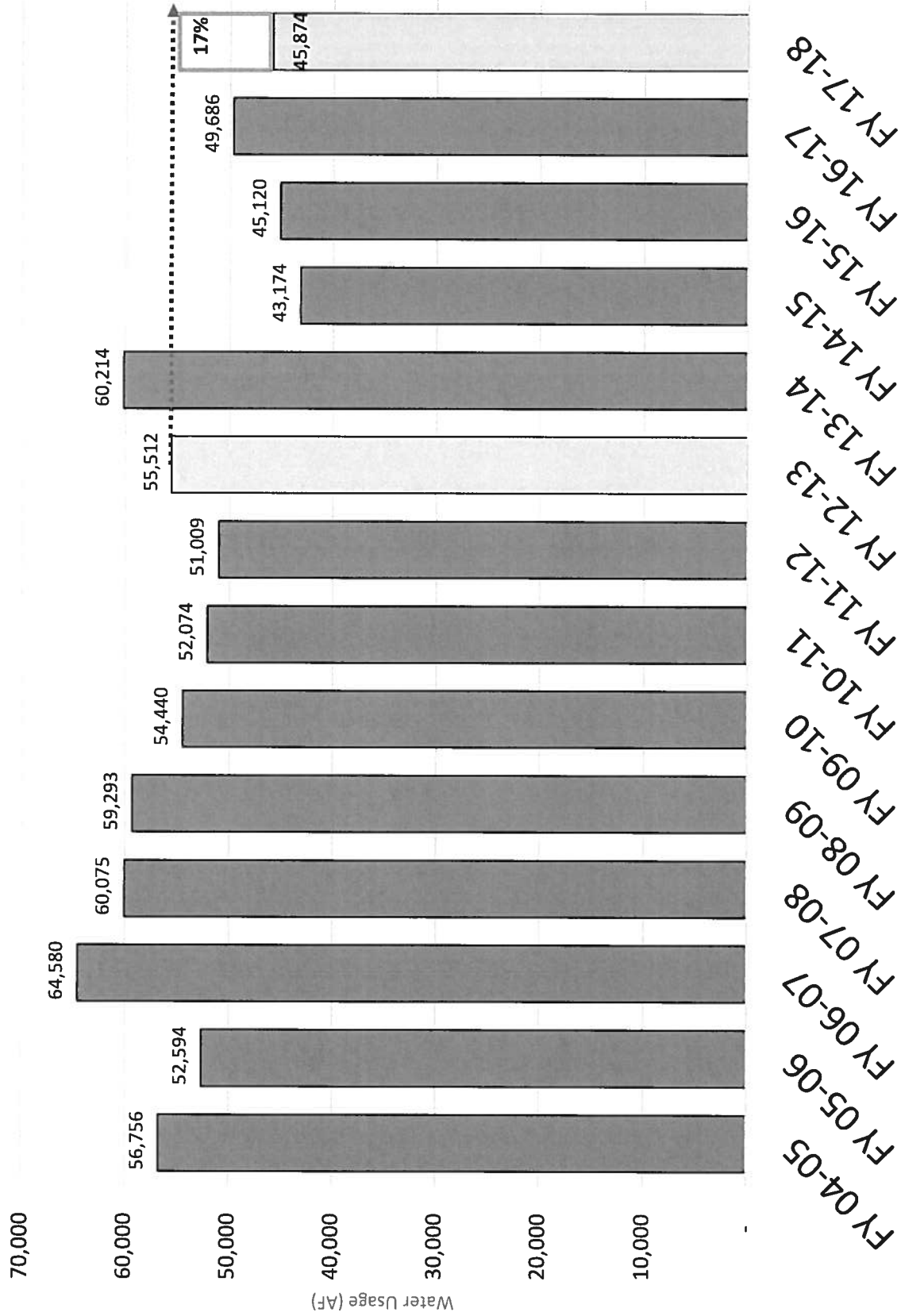

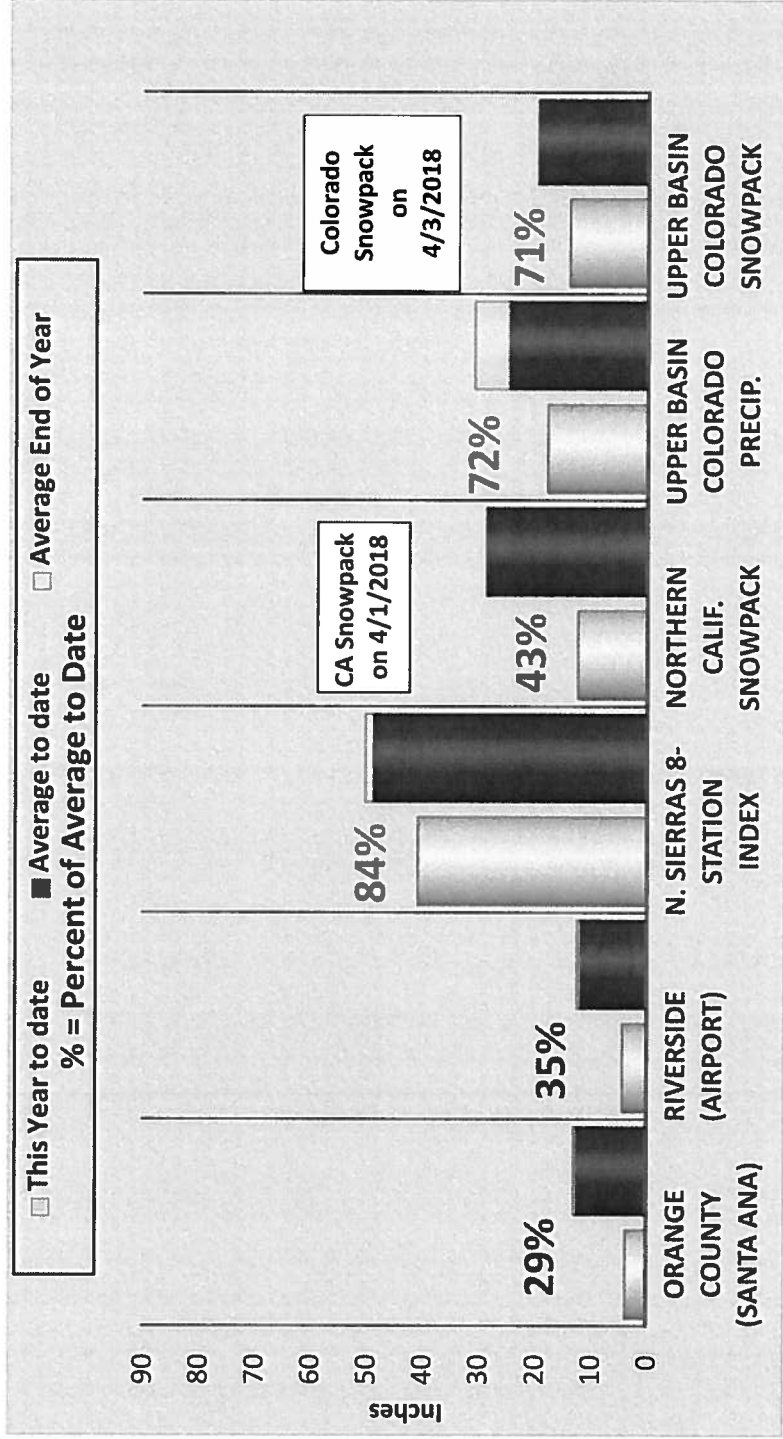

Historical May OC Water Demands



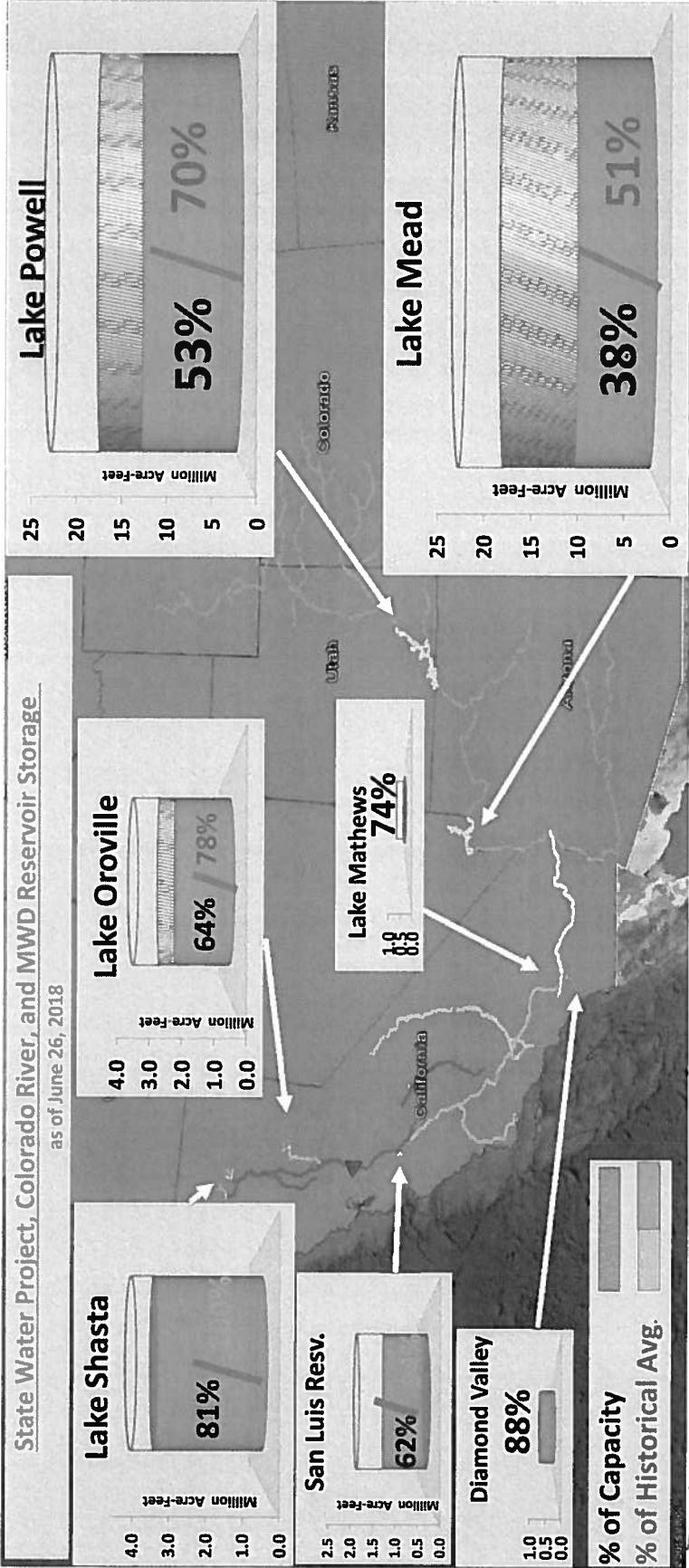
Accumulated Precipitation

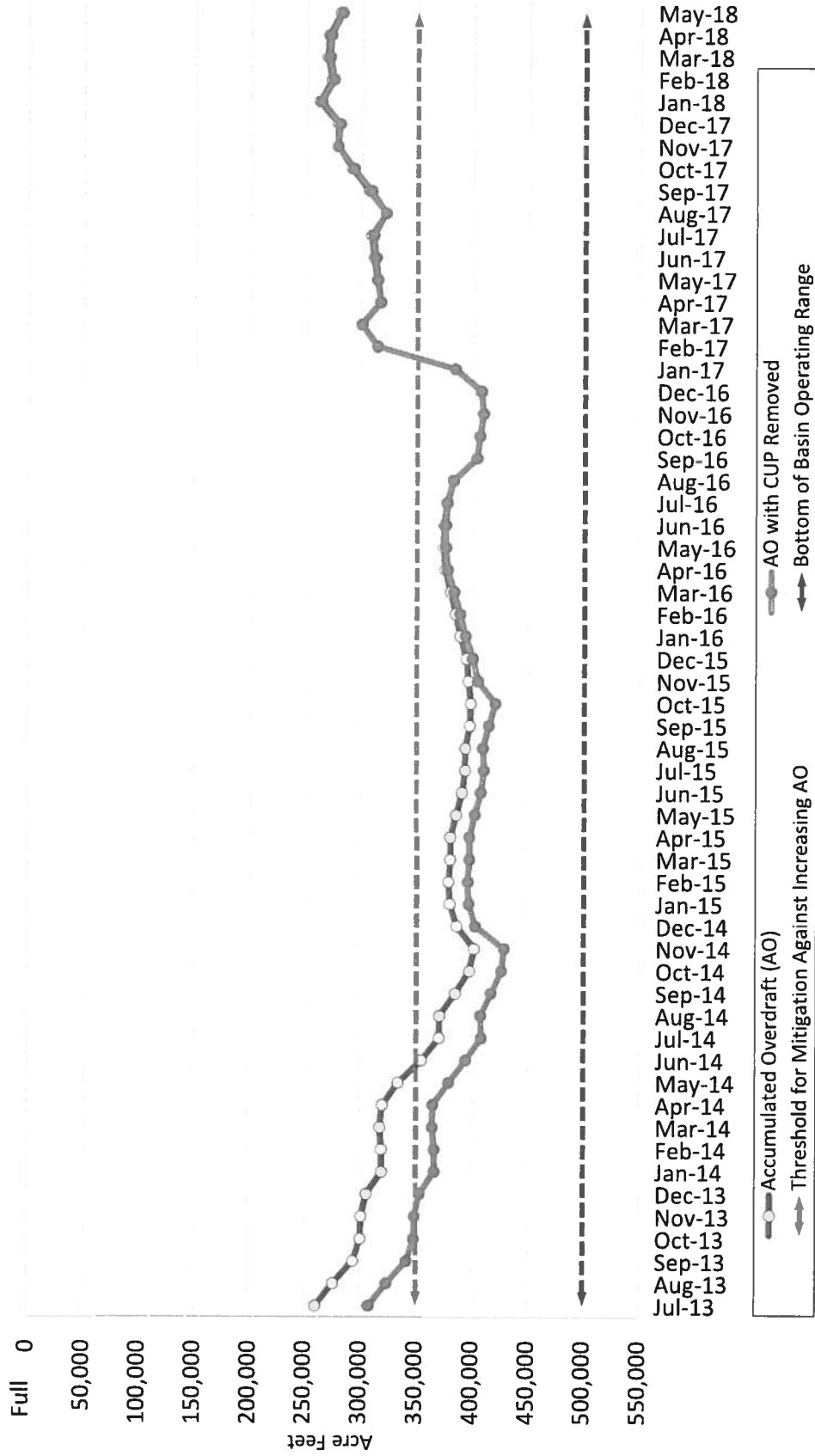
State Water Project, Colorado River, and MWD Reservoir Storage

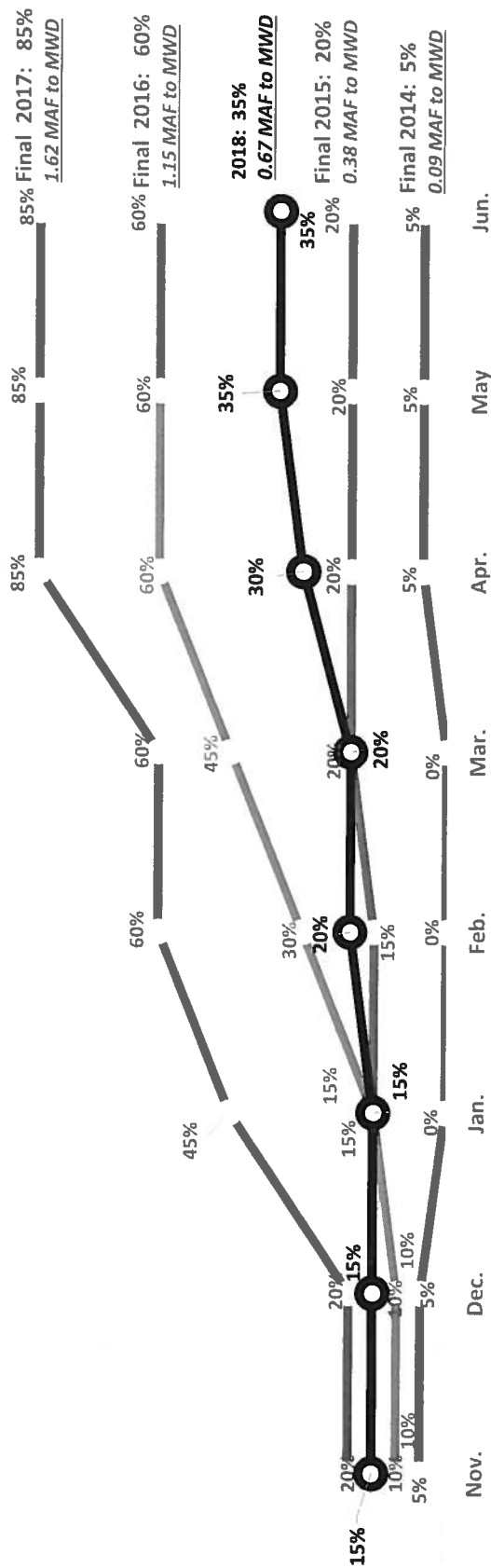


Accumulated Overdraft of the OCWD Groundwater Basin as of May 2018



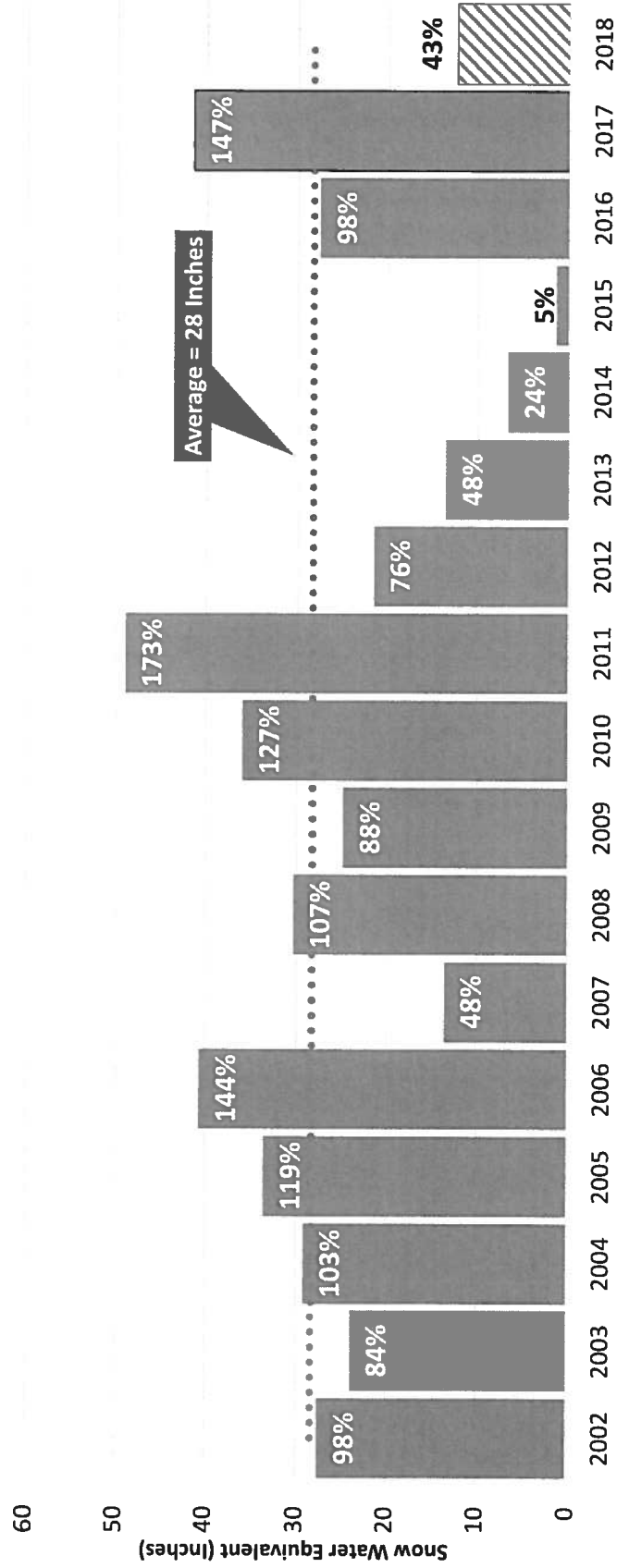

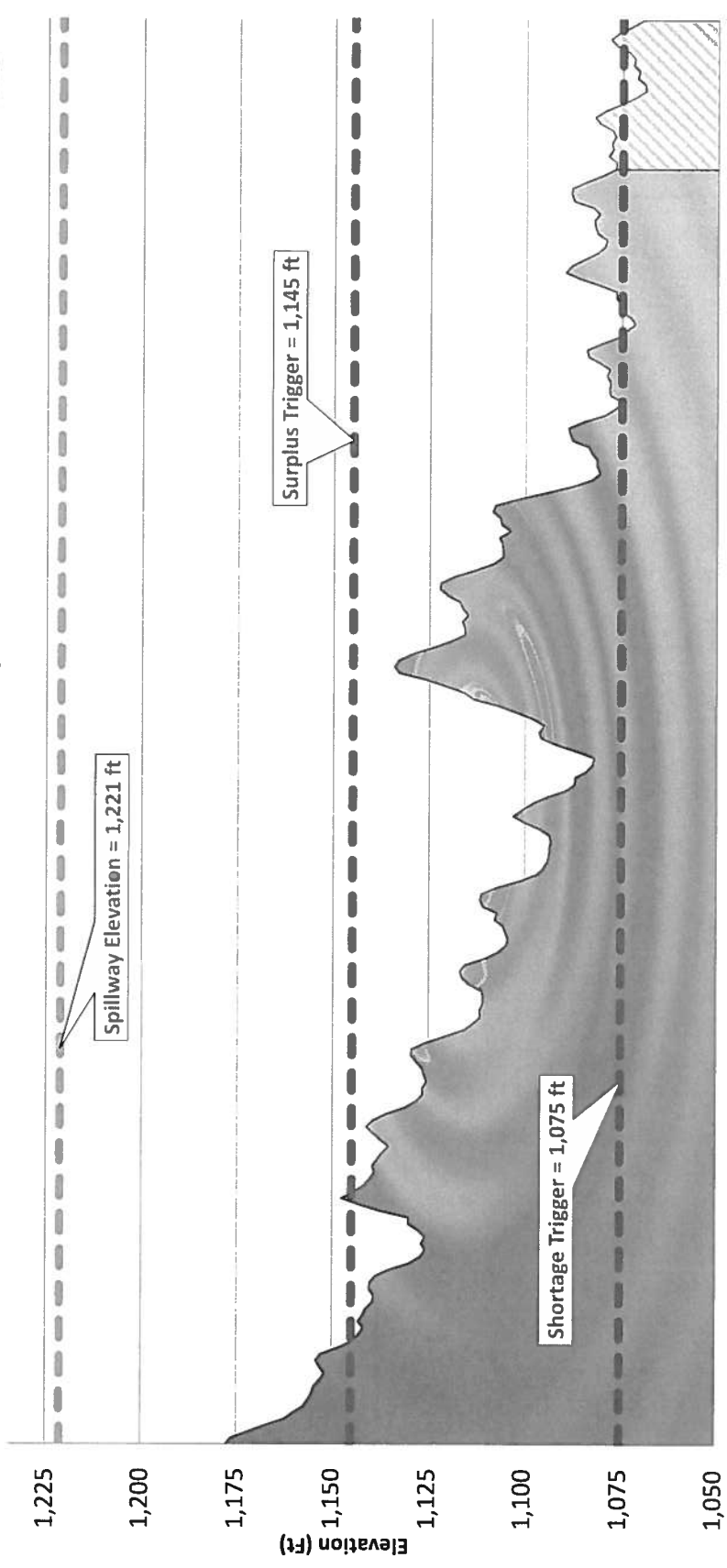
Historical Northern California April 1st Peak Snow Water Equivalent





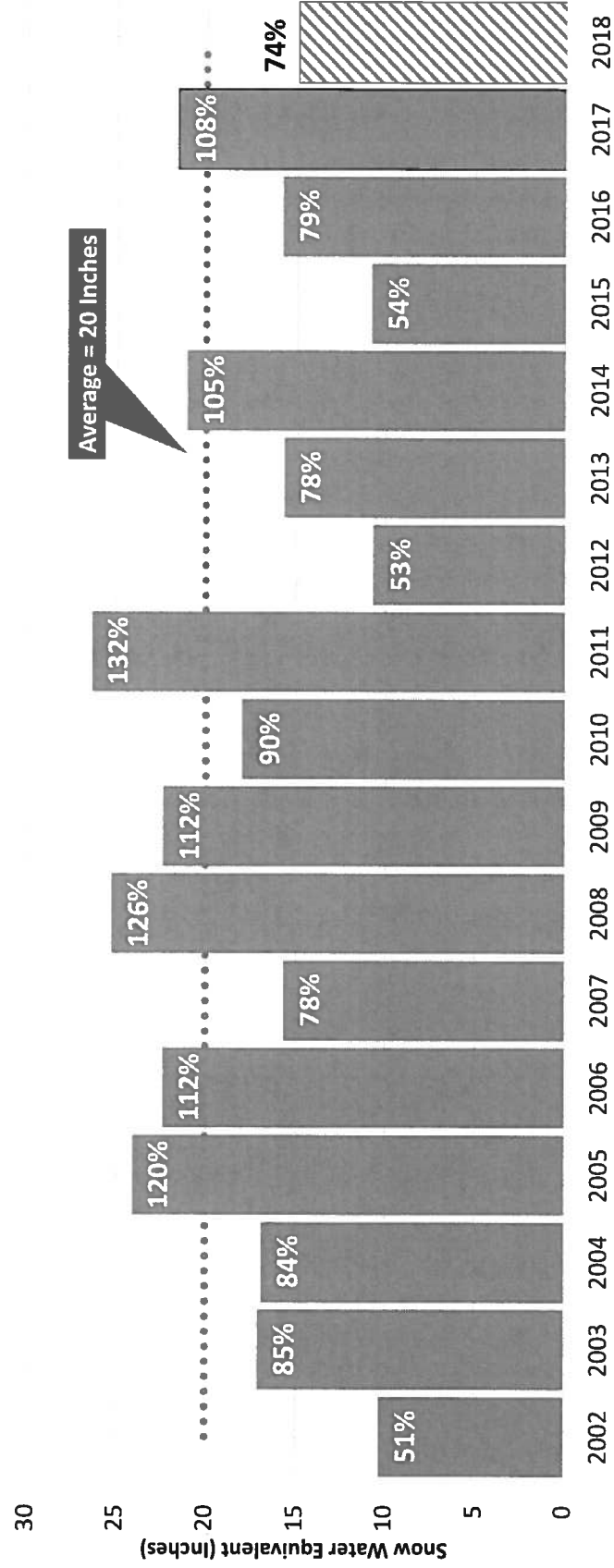
Lake Mead Levels: Historical and Projected projection per USBR 24-Month Study

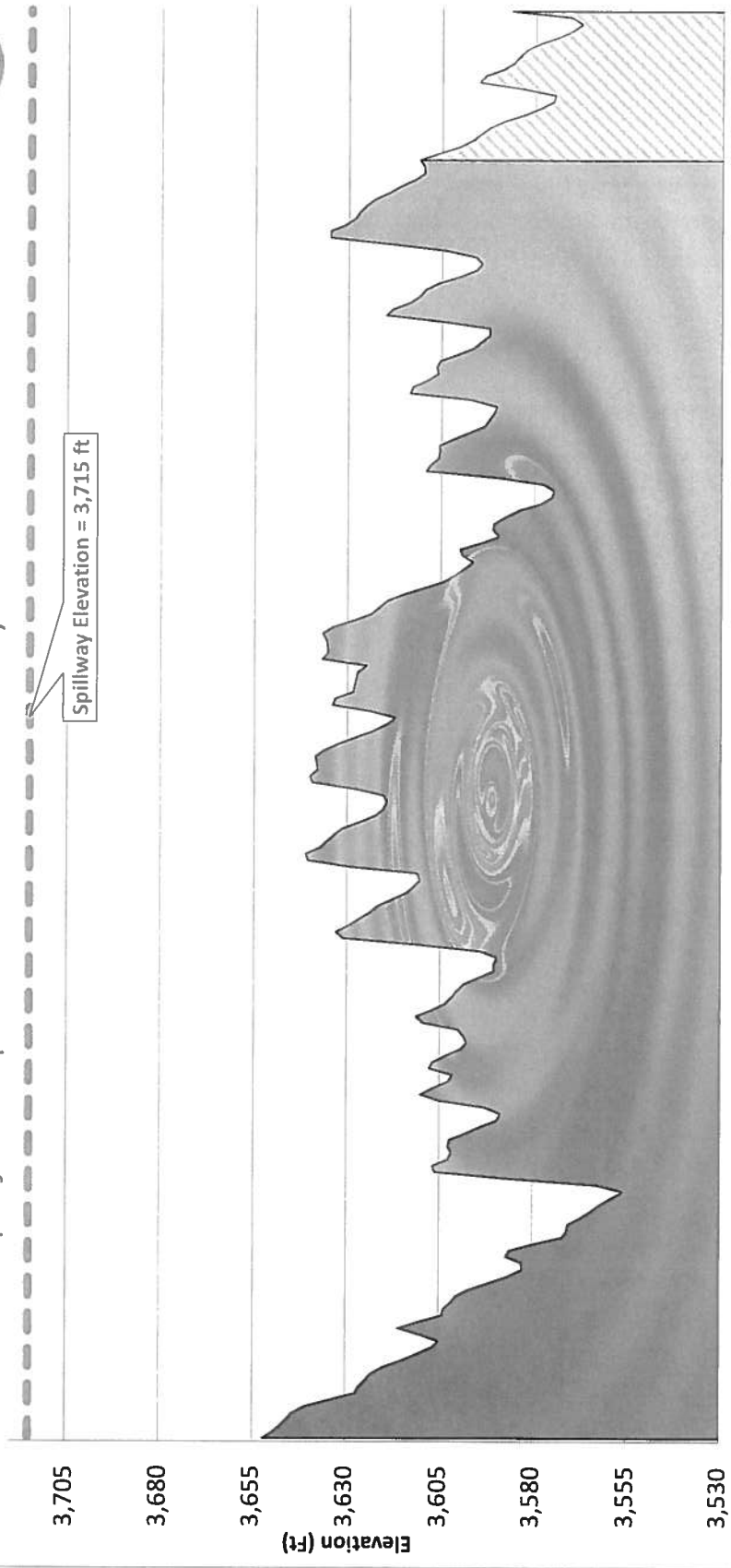
Historical Colorado Basin April 15th Peak Snow Water Equivalent

Summer Internship Experiences

More than 40 GGUSD students are engaging in a powerful summer internship experience through Orange County United Way's Youth Career Connections program, which combines work-based learning with career experiences in a wide-range of professional industries. The internship program is a capstone course for incoming seniors enrolled

in GGUSD's high school Career and Technical Education (CTE) Career Pathways.

Students spend a week in the classroom with GGUSD CTE teachers to build communication, collaboration and research skills, work on their resumes, create LinkedIn profiles and hear from industry guest speakers. Two GGUSD teachers team-teach the class and make site visits to monitor students' progress on the job.

The work-based internship takes place in July and students return to the classroom in August to reflect and present to their classmates about what they learned. At the completion of the of the program, students earn 10 credits and CTE completion certificates.

On July 3, **Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (OCMVCD)** confirmed the first mosquito sample to test positive for WNV in 2018, in Garden Grove. The mosquitoes were collected near Garden Grove Blvd. and Newhope St.

Yesterday, OCMVCD staff canvassed the impacted neighborhoods, distributing flyers, posters, and inspecting front and backyards for any detection of mosquito breeding sites. The City and OCMVCD urge residents to protect themselves from the bite of a mosquito by wearing repellent, keeping doors and windows closed or screened, and eliminating breeding sources by dumping standing water, including water from potted plant saucers, and cleaning bird baths and pet water bowls.

OC Streetcar costs top \$400M; construction delayed to the fall

Instead of starting this summer as anticipated, construction of the OC Streetcar in Garden Grove and Santa Ana has been pushed to the fall, and the project's cost estimates have increased by more than \$100 million.

The streetcar is projected to cost \$407.76 million, up from a nearly \$300 million estimate made in 2017. Orange County Transportation Authority officials on Monday approved changes to the funding plan, taking the additional money needed from Measure M2, a local sales tax earmarked for public transportation projects.

The streetcar's purpose is to connect Metrolink stations and some of the county's busiest bus routes with residential and employment hubs such as Santa Ana's downtown and Civic Center.

Tracks will be laid along existing roads on the streetcar's 4.15-mile route. The streetcar's electric vehicles will travel in lanes with car traffic.

Though most of the OCTA board supported the additional funding, Orange County Supervisor Michelle Steel and Anaheim Mayor Tom Tait — a vocal opponent of a streetcar proposed in his city — voted against what Tait called "a huge waste of money."

In an email from her office, Steel said the project's cost is now too high.

"A 35 percent budget increase, more than \$100 million, to cover

delays is too much, and I don't believe it's financially feasible," Steel said.

Soaring construction costs aren't unique to the OC Streetcar, OCTA spokesman Joel Zlotnik said. They're happening to infrastructure projects all over the country, he said.

The price of materials is rising, probably caused in part by tariffs by President Donald Trump's administration on imported products such as steel and aluminum, Zlotnik said.

Southern California is also a tight construction market, with competition from a major expansion of the 405 Freeway in Orange County and big transportation projects in Los Angeles, River-

side and San Bernardino counties, he said.

A delay in getting a funding agreement signed with the Federal Transit Administration slowed the construction bidding process, which also pushed up costs, officials said.

Santa Ana Mayor Miguel Pulido, who sits on OCTA's board, said he doesn't expect any more significant cost hikes for the streetcar because contractors are now bound to deliver at the price they promised in their bids.

OCTA officials expect to award a construction contract for the OC Streetcar in August and have a federal funding agreement signed in October.

Pulido noted that although Orange County typically pays out more than it gets back in state and federal grants, 60 percent of the streetcar funding will come from those sources.

"The fact that we have so many dollars coming in from either Sacramento or Washington, that's a big deal," Pulido said.

La Habra Mayor Tim Shaw, who is vice chairman of the board, said the additional \$108 million in local dollars comes from a fund voters agreed should be used for transit connections to Metrolink stations, so it is limited how the money can be spent.

With the density of jobs and residents in downtown Santa Ana, Orange County "is the place where something like this is going to work," he said.

The streetcar is expected to begin operating in 2021, officials said.

Garden Grove batch first in 2018 to show malady in county

A batch of mosquitoes collected July 3 in Garden Grove has tested positive for West Nile virus, the county's first positive tests this year, the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District confirmed Monday.

The batch of 117 mosquitoes, collected near Garden Grove Boulevard and Newhope Street, was the first of 1,882 samples examined by Vector Control since January to test positive for the virus.

West Nile virus is transmitted to humans and animals by infected mosquitoes that feed on dead birds carrying the virus. So far, there have been no confirmed human cases or dead birds reported in Orange County.

In most human cases, the virus is asymptomatic, but some people may experience fever, headache and body aches. In extreme

cases, West Nile virus may require hospitalization and be fatal. Young children, the elderly and people with compromised immune systems are at a higher risk for infection.

A statement released by the public health agency said district staffers will be surveying the surrounding area, notifying residents and working with city officials to identify infrastructure problems that could potentially create breeding grounds.

Mosquitoes need just a teaspoon of water to lay their eggs, said Mary-Joy Coburn, a Vector Control spokeswoman. The recent heat wave and humidity will accelerate their life cycle, she said, and may increase the number of potential carriers of the disease.

But, Coburn added, the agency expects a mild West Nile virus season because of the timing of the first positive tests.

"This being later, early July, that pretty much indicates it's towards the end of the season," Coburn said. "When it gets cooler again in October and November, then hopefully it will dwindle down, too. Although we

have had cases in December."

Last year, vector officials reported 38 confirmed human cases — including four deaths — and 280 samples of mosquitoes confirmed to be carrying the virus, in line with the annual average, Coburn said.

In 2014, a particularly bad year for West Nile virus in Orange County, there were 282 verified human cases and nine deaths.

West Nile virus first appeared in California in 2003 and is considered endemic to Orange County and much of Southern California because of the warm climate. Transmittance of the disease is more likely in the summer, because of the abundance of water-related activities.

"We have our gardens, we're watering our plants. Kids are in the pool. There's a lot of activities that generate water and it's the standing water," Coburn said.

Vector Control advises people to empty containers filled with water at least once a week, to regularly clean bird baths and pet bowls and to dump all water from potted plant saucers to eliminate potential

breeding grounds.

Officials advise the public to take the following steps to prevent mosquito bites:

- Apply mosquito repellents to exposed skin before going outside and reapply as necessary.
- Use repellent containing

DEET, Picaridin, IR3535 or oil of lemon eucalyptus.

- Close all unscreened doors and windows to prevent entry and repair all damaged screens to increase protection.

- Wear light-colored, long-sleeved shirts and long pants.

Residents are encouraged to call Vector Control if they see an unusually high number of day-biting mosquitoes. For more information, call the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District at 714-971-2421 or 949-654-2421 or visit ocvector.org.

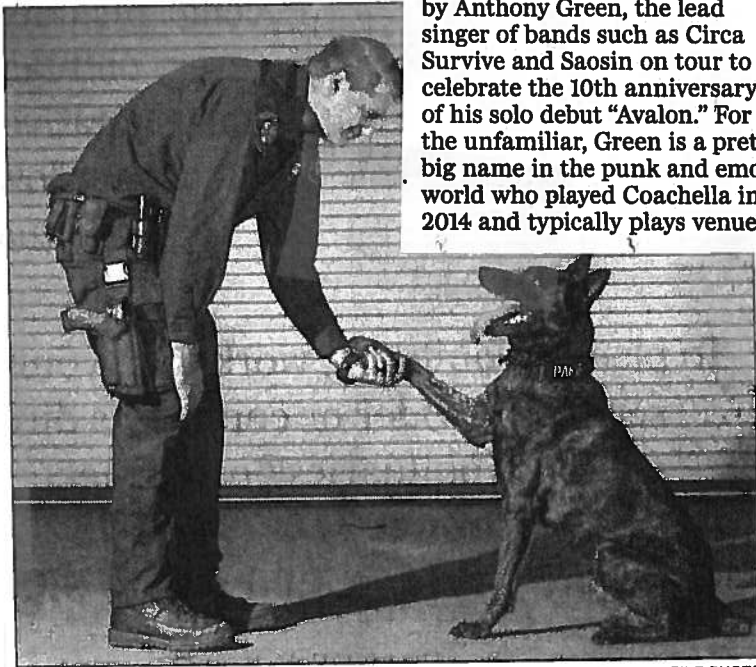

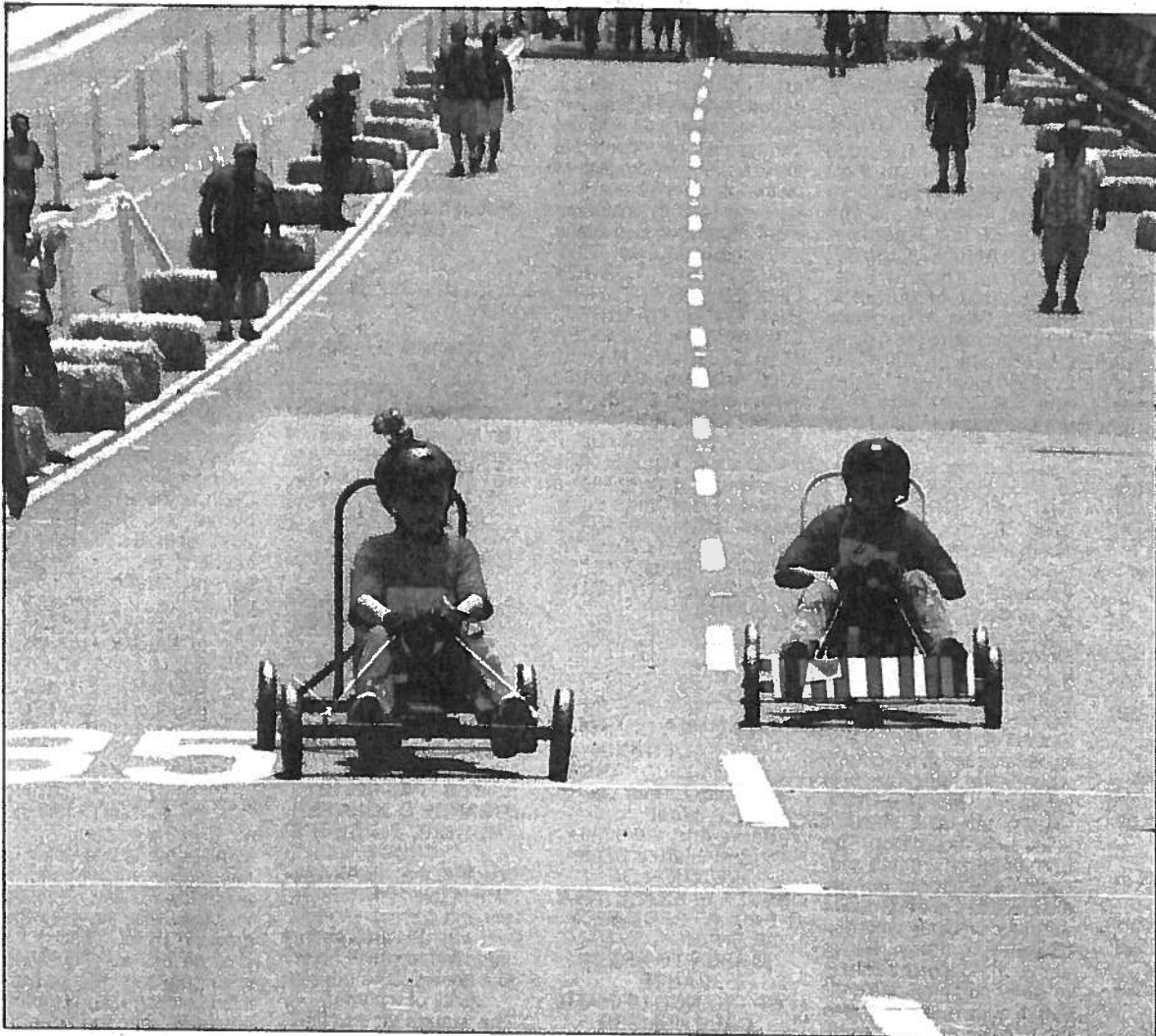
other half of Team Tackney). “And they get to meet new people and it’s a positive experience toward building character. Thank you Scouts for your bravery.”

City officials consider contracting with county for fire services

Garden Grove is in jeopardy of losing its Fire Department.

City officials, facing a budget crisis, are considering the cost-cutting measure of doing away with the municipal Fire Department and contracting with the Orange County Fire Authority.

"We think there would be some benefits to the city..." said City Manager Scott Stiles, at last week's City Council meeting.

Moving responsibility for fire services to the county would save the city \$2.5 million in operational costs this fiscal year, and \$8.5 million over the next four fiscal years,

according to a study conducted by the county Fire Authority.

Garden Grove faces a multi-million-dollar budget deficit for 2018-19, according to a city staff analysis and Managing Partners, a consulting firm. The cause of the deficit? Massive public employee pension costs that outpace revenue growth, officials say.

The city Fire Department employs 84 people, including 29 sworn firefighters.

Projected pension costs for 2018-19 — a separate expense from operational funding — are \$3.5 million, according to the city.

City officials are also mulling a 1-percent sales tax increase to add about \$19 million a year to city coffers. The current sales tax is 7.75 percent.

The city's contract with the firefighters' union expired on July 1. City leaders are now exploring all options.

Last week, the City Council reviewed a staff analysis on the issue of moving fire services to

the county authority, which would cost about \$22.5 million a year for the first five years.

City officials have said all firefighters working for the city would be eligible-for-hire by the OCFA if fire services are moved to the county.

City Manager Stiles has said the idea of moving to a county fire service was initially brought up by the city firefighters' union. He has also said that the city will begin preparing a two-year fiscal budget in January, 2019.

Garden Grove Fire Department Chief Tom Schultz said

some services would improve if the city fire department "merged" with OCFA.

"Paramedic response times would improve with the proposed redeployment of staffing," he said.

Schultz said the department has 12 certified paramedics on duty at all times; OCFA would be able to fund 14.

A study session on the issue of fire services will be put on the agenda for a future City Council meeting. No date has been set for such a meeting.

The Facebook thread contained hundreds of comments; some folks praised police, but for the most part it was one long argument that I had the misfortune of reading while working up a story on illegal fireworks (police handed out 71, \$1,000 citations on July 4).

It got super silly when some residents called the suspect an American hero.

It got petulant when one man made this declaration:

"A police department that hates America."

I wasn't going to weigh in until I read that comment.

And I don't want to start a row on these pages. But I will say this: Do we have to argue about everything? Does every disagreement have to get nasty?

Thankfully, nobody lost fingers or a limb because of illegal fireworks. Thankfully, no child got burned and scarred. Thankfully, no spouse or parent or sibling was in tears after learning that a loved one was spending the holiday in a hospital. Thankfully, we have common-sense laws, and we have men and women who enforce those laws. Thankfully, those who endanger others and break laws are stopped, and punished.

A positive thing, right?

“Hello Dolly!” wows crowds at GG’s Gem Theatre

One More Productions kicks summer into high gear with its unprecedented rendition of the classic, “Hello Dolly!”

The story of Dolly Gallagher Levi is based on the Thornton Wilder play, “The Matchmaker,” with book by Michael Stewart and music and lyrics by Jerry Herman. This much-revised musical gets another shot at wowing its audience at the Gem Theatre in Garden Grove with OMP’s own magical take on the meddling broad from Yonkers who knows there is more than one way to skin a cat.

Never one to give an audience what is expected, Director Damien Lorton brings a gigglier, less edgy Dolly to the forefront as the audience welcomes talented Adriana Sanchez as the multi-tasking matchmaker who has her eye on the prize.

The prize, of course, is the crotchety penny pincher, Horace Vandergelder, who is brought to life by Tim Klega. Vandergelder’s cantankerous ways tend to eventually change as he loses control of his world as he’s known it.

Director Lorton manages to keep the rapid pace of the show under control while also maintaining a sense of the comedic structure of the piece and a recognition of the dramatic undertones.

The major subplot is the budding romance between Cornelius (Josh Curtis-Switzer) and Irene (Erika Baldwin) and it is beautifully delivered with their stunning duet, “It Only Takes a Moment.”

Dolly is a lavish production, and the musical numbers rest with

choreographers Heather Smith and Alan Collins, who produce outstanding moments of movement with an eye-popping execution of dance and athleticism.

Damien Lorton’s small butt-kicking orchestra with Toni Helms on piano, Jeff Segal on drums, Nic Gonzalez on bass, Tony Bernetich on guitar/banjo, Matthew LaBell on trumpet, Vince Hizon on woodwinds, and Jesse Tellez on trombone reel in as much excitement as a 30-piece orchestra.

With 170 shimmering costumes, ambitious costume designers Ramzi Jneid and Larry Watts bring a rich vibrancy and gorgeous array of color to the stage.

This is a large, talented cast, and along with the six main characters, other must mentions are: Hannah Gomez as Ernestina, Barbara Dice as Mrs. Rose, John Gillies, hilarious as the Judge, John Michell as Rudolph, and Erika Baldwin’s angelic vocals.

The director/musical director and co-owner of OMP shared with the audience that Dolly was dear to his heart because at the age of 16 this was the first professional show he ever did and the last show that his beloved late mother ever had the chance to see.

This show is a gift to him from him and a shimmering do-not-miss spectacular for the rest of us.

District offers valuable summer internship program

More than 40 Garden Grove Unified School District students are engaging in a powerful summer internship experience through Orange County United Way's Youth Career Connections program, which combines work-based learning with career experiences in a wide-range of professional industries.

The internship program is a capstone course for incoming seniors enrolled in the district's high school Career and Technical Education (CTE) Career Pathways.

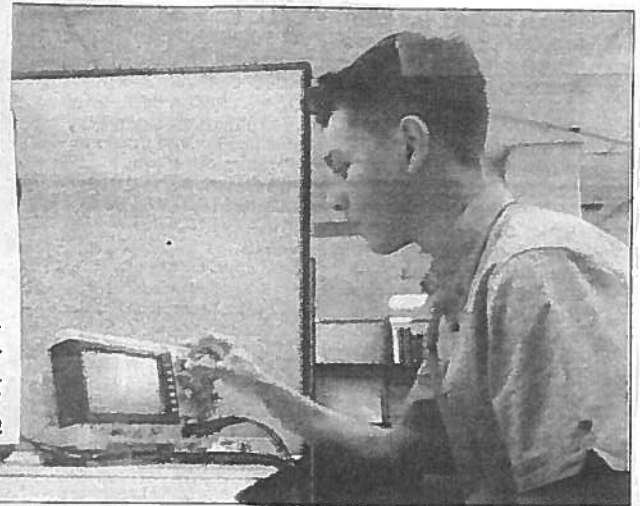

students for lifelong success," said Lan Nguyen, Board of Education vice president. "A career internship is an invaluable opportunity for students to explore their interests and sharpen their skills in a way that's just not possible in a classroom setting."

Orange County United Way maximizes its relationships with local business leaders to provide the district's Career and Technical Education students with internship opportunities, as well as college scholarships, a bus pass, and workshops that help students gain workplace skills frequently used in a professional setting. The Orange County Department of Education Career Technical Education partnership also helps secure industry partners and provides course content.

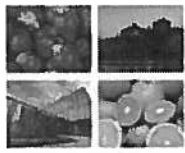
Students spend a week in the classroom with district CTE teachers to build communication, collaboration and research skills, work on their resumes, create LinkedIn

profiles and hear from industry guest speakers. Two district teachers team-teach the class and make site visits to monitor students' progress on the job.

The work-based internship takes place in July and students return to the classroom in August to reflect and present to their classmates about what they learned. At the completion of the program, students earn 10 credits and CTE completion certificates.

The internship opportunities cover a wide range of industry sectors including arts, media, and entertainment, engineering and architecture, health services and medical technology and information and computer technology. Employers with the district's interns include Active Learning, Bob's Auto, CIELO, Healthy Smiles for Kids, Martinez Insurance, Santori Law Group, Thomas House Family Shelter, UCI Medical Center, and Ware Malcomb.

This is the third year the district has offered an internship program and the second year partnering with Orange County United Way's Youth Career Connections.

“Dolly” shows its “meddle” at the Gem

She’s the one you go to, when you’ve got marriage on the mind.

“Hello, Dolly” has just begun its run at the Gem Theater in Garden Grove: it’s the dawn of the 20th century, and the audience is introduced to the rambunctious and renowned Dolly Gallagher Levi (Adriana Sanchez), the local matchmaker — vivacious and brash, who speaks her mind in no uncertain terms — and who is the very best at what she does.

(<https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/08/stagereviewbug.jpg>) “Some people paint, some sew – I meddle!” she proclaims to one prospective customer. She’s also a woman who wears many hats, both literally and figuratively: as her varied business cards declare, Dolly also serves as a dance instructor, a musical instructor – as well as being involved in myriad other sidelines. But though she’s arranging the happiness of her clients, the widow does have her own dreams to – perhaps – love again... but only if she feels she’s gained the blessing of her beloved late husband, Ephram.

Tasked with arranging the marriage of the cranky and temperamental “half-a-millionaire” Horace Vandergelder (Tim Klega), Dolly begins sowing doubts in his mind about wedding the young widow and hat shop owner, Irene Malloy (Erika Baldwin.) She instead suggests that she

knows an heiress who may be interested in him – and if that somehow doesn’t pan out, she has one more possible name on her short list of candidates... “a name I know as well as my own”, she slyly proclaims.

Meanwhile, other players have been set in motion, each with their own dreams of love and marriage: the artist Ambrose Kemper (Peter Crisafulli) who seeks – for the moment, unsuccessfully – to wed Horace’s niece, the perennially tearful Ermengarde (Hannah Gomez); not to mention the pair of overworked and underpaid clerks employed at the wealthy man’s shop in Yonkers, New York. Cornelius Hackl (Josh Curtis-Switzer) and Barnaby (Jacob Wayne), just want one day off to visit the big city, have a swell meal – maybe even kiss a girl! – and the wily matchmaker suggests the two visit the very hat shop in New York City run by Irene and her assistant Minnie Fay (Kelly Rosales).

It may be an intricately woven web, but far from tangled: and while the professional meddler has all the pieces of the game in place, the next move by the master manipulator may be her own...

Truly, it is baffling the consistency and level of quality of the productions at the Gem Theater. The venue’s resident troupe, One More Productions, recently celebrated their 14th anniversary at the location, under the dedicated and devoted eyes of OMP founders Nicole Cassesso and Damien Lorton (who produced and directed the show, respectively.)

(<https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2018/05/greatmovielogo.jpg>) There is much to both marvel at, and revel in, with this production: the ornate, lavish and detailed costuming is a virtual feast for the eyes, and the dance numbers are a spectacle of color, energy and poise (“The Waiters’ Gallop” in Act II is a particular show-stopper, with Jon Michell stealing scenes as the manic-yet-charming head waiter Rudolph.) But the sonorous music brought to life by the skills of the performers (including the unseen, indispensable live orchestra) is the true wonder.



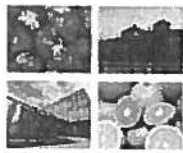
Baldwin’s stunning vocal skills shine in the tune, “Ribbons Down My Back”; Klega and company charm with the not-quite PC ditty, “It Takes A Woman” (a distinct throwback to a time before women’s suffrage); and Curtis-Switzer is marvelous and melodious as Cornelius, with a beautiful rendition of “It Only Takes A Moment” with Baldwin, as well as in “Put On Your Sunday Clothes” with Wayne, Crisafulli, Gomez, and the remarkable ensemble.

Without question, though, the scintillating star of the show is Adriana Sanchez, portraying the titular Dolly.

Patrons may recognize her from other productions at the Gem, such as last year’s “Follies”, and the quite popular annual “Holiday Gem” (portraying the bombastic Mrs. Claus): but it is doubtless that she brings all her talents to bear in “Dolly.” Not only does she breathe life into classics such as “I Put My Hand In” and “Hello, Dolly”, but her love for the character and passion for the role of a determined woman finding her path through helping others – sometimes whether they like it or not – makes Dolly a lovable, charming and endearing persona... someone, perhaps, even to aspire to.

“Hello, Dolly”, is still another in a string of striking and beautifully-realized productions at The Gem Theater in Garden Grove: a must-see show, presented by a talented and familial acting troupe, who will most certainly have much more great things to offer the local theater scene in the months and years to come.

“Hello, Dolly!” Adriana Sanchez, Tim Klega, Josh Curtis-Switzer and Erika Baldwin star in this charming musical romp surrounding a matchmaker in the early 20th century, and her own quest for love. 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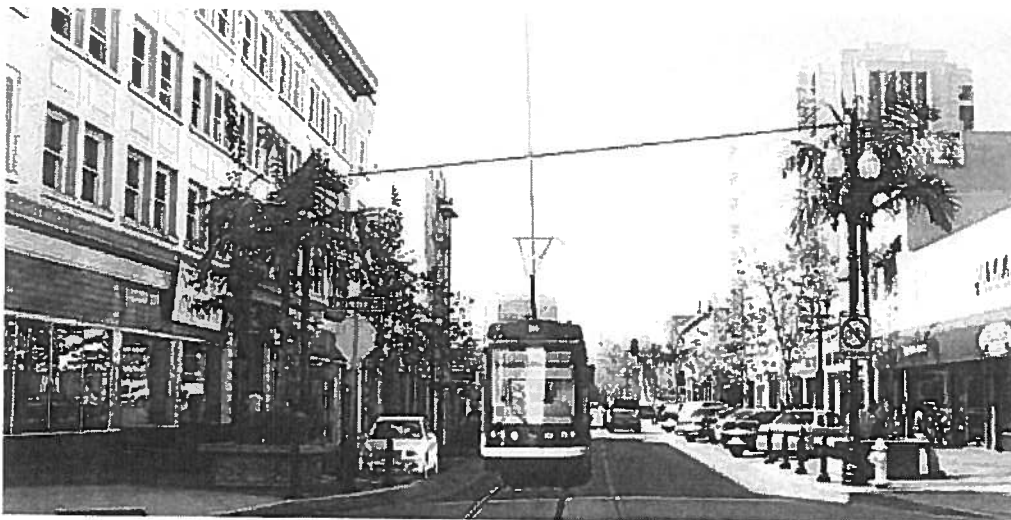

OC Streetcar project is getting pricier

The OC Streetcar project planned to link Santa Ana and Garden Grove is still coming, but it will be a bit late arriving and a chunk more expensive.

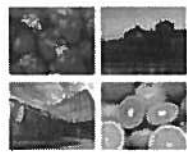
Last week the Orange County Transportation Authority's board of directors approved more funding for the project, raising the total cost to \$407.76 million.

That's an increase of over \$100 million. The increased expenses are blamed on higher construction bid prices, inflation and rising material costs.

To pay for the difference, the OCTA board voted to use more Measure M funds raised by the county's half-cent sales tax for transportation.

The new plan was another step toward getting a nearly \$150 million grant from the Federal Transit Administration.

Construction, originally planned to begin this summer, will commence later this year with testing and operations to begin in 2021.

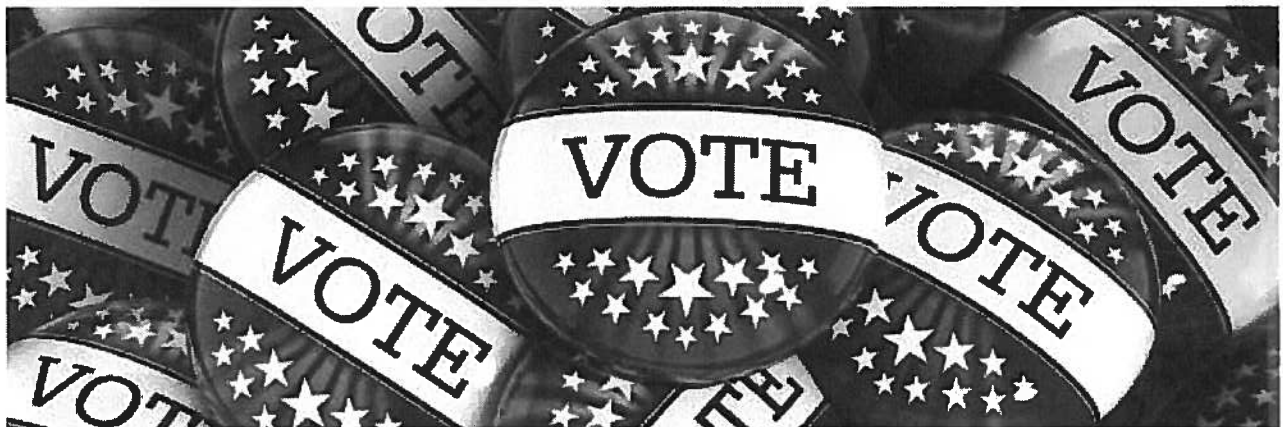

Election campaign starting today

THE 2018 LOCAL ELECTION season begins today (July 16).

It's Monday, July 16, and campaign season for local city councils and mayors starts today.

The deadline for filing completed paperwork is Friday, Aug. 10 at 5 p.m. The election will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 6. To qualify, candidates need to submit a petition bearing the names, signatures and addresses of at least 20 people who are registered voters in their district, or – in the case of a citywide election for mayor or other post – within the city.

(<https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/08/all-politics-is-local.jpg>) People seeking office are encouraged to get as many as 30 signatures as it is common for some to be invalid. There's no filing fee, but there is a charge for candidates who wish to have a statement appearing on the ballot.

Stanton will be debuting its new district system this year, and Garden Grove will be in its second phase. Huntington Beach remains with its at-large process, while Westminster will – for the first time – be electing a mayor for a four-year term.

All Politics Is Local

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Here is a list of “open seats” to be contested this fall, based on information from the city clerk’s offices for each city.

- **Garden Grove:** Three council seats and the mayor’s post will be on the ballot. The mayor’s spot, which is elected for a two-year term, is now held by Steve Jones. Also to be decided by the public will be who will represent District 1 (Kris Beard is the incumbent), District 3 (Thu-Ha Nguyen) and District 4 (Patrick Phat Bui). Council members are chosen for four-year terms.
- **Huntington Beach.** Four seats on the seven-member council will be contested this fall. All council members are chosen at-large, and the mayor chosen by the council. Contested seats are now held by Mayor Mike Posey and council members Erik Peterson, Barbara Delgleize and William “Billy” O’Connell.
- **Stanton:**The city will be pioneering a brand new system of electing city officials. The mayor’s spot will be chosen by the voters at large and the council members chosen by district. Sitting council members from District One are current mayor David Shawver and Rigoberto Ramirez. District 3 is not assigned to any incumbent. Only the District 1 and 3 seats will be on the ballot this year. District Seats 2 and 4 will be contested in 2020. Brian Donahue is not assigned to any district seat on the ballot this year and his current term expires this year. He is eligible to run for mayor.
- **Westminster:** Seats up for selection by voters are now held by Mayor Tri Ta and Councilmembers Tyler Diep and Margie Rice, all on an at-large basis.

To be eligible in any of these cities, a candidate must be a U.S. citizen who will be at least 18 years old by Election Day. In mayoral contests, candidates must be residents of their city and for districts, be a resident of that district.

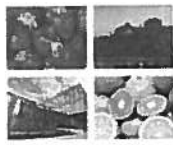
Valley View Street is the "main street" for West Garden Grove. It's where west-siders do much of their shopping and dining. But there's been some concern about vacancies and closures in that business district.

A major expansion of the cemetery area on the grounds of the Christ Cathedral campus will go before the Garden Grove Planning Commission on Thursday, July 19.

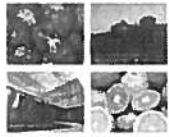
What's proposed is the completion – with some modifications – of a previously approved expansion of the Memorial Gardens at Lewis Street and Chapman Avenue.

The proposed site plan calls for a modification of the maximum building height requirements for those structures.

Also on the agenda is a request for a conditional use permit to demolish an existing 50-foot tall pole sign and to replace it with a new 59-foot tall V-shaped, freeway-oriented electronic reader board sign for Next Sports. That's an indoor sports facility located at 12821 Knott St. The sign would face the Garden Grove (22) Freeway.

The commission meets at 7 p.m. in the council chamber in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Ave.

This past Tuesday, July 10, City officials and developer Kam Sang Company celebrated the grand opening and ribbon cutting for Phase I of Brookhurst Place—the City's largest residential and commercial mixed-use development.

Located in the Korean Business District, Brookhurst Place is bound by Brookhurst Street, Brookhurst Way, and Garden Grove Boulevard.

At the grand opening event, Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones said, "The completion of Phase I comes during an important turning point for Garden Grove, when we're dynamically re-energizing and re-imagining ourselves. Cities Can Apply for SoCalGas Grants for Climate Adaptation and Resiliency Planning

Applications due Aug. 15

July 13, 2018

SoCalGas will award grants of \$50,000 each to two municipalities to support local planning efforts to prepare for climate-change risks.

Applications are due Aug. 15.

The competitive [grant program](#) is designed to help cities and counties reduce the impact of such threats, which are expected to increase over the next decade. These risks include extreme heat, wildfires, drought, sea level rise, flooding and other extreme weather events. An advisory panel of planning and sustainability experts from the Los Angeles Regional Collaborative for Climate Action and Sustainability (LARC), Climate Resolve, and the American Planning Association-California Chapter (APA-California) will select the winning applications from throughout Southern and Central California.

Criteria

Grant proposals will be assessed according to:

- **Collaboration:** The extent to which the proposal reflects coordination and partnerships with a diverse range of stakeholders such as energy and water utilities, transportation and housing agencies, etc.
- **Co-Benefits:** The extent to which the proposal identifies potential added benefits of the adaptation work, such as benefits to public health, air quality, reductions in greenhouse gas emissions, and the economy.

New League Drone Policy Incorporates Local and Law Enforcement Priorities

July 13, 2018

The League formally adopted its statewide drone policy during its June Board of Directors meeting.

While the organization has weighed in on drone issues for several years, it did not have an established or robust policy until this action. The new policy will serve as a roadmap for a drone regulatory structure that works for cities and local law enforcement.

A task force of 15 elected officials, staff, and law enforcement from the League's Public Safety and Transportation, Communications, and Public Works policy committees developed the drone policy.

The policy comprises three main sections that address the belief that cities are in the best position to determine certain aspects of drone regulation. The sections are:

- The role of the state;
- Codifying local law enforcement's ability to enforce state; and
- Local drone laws and the role of local regulations.

The adoption of this policy is timely with threats of preemption ever-present at both the state and federal level from the drone industry and others who seek to subvert local authority. As such, the League is now better prepared to further engage on this issue and will enable cities to regulate drones to their fullest extent possible.

Legislature Forms Wildfire Preparedness and Response Conference Committee

July 13, 2018

The Legislature has focused on wildfire issues throughout the 2018 legislative session as a result of last year's unprecedented wildfire season.

Legislators introduced more than 70 bills this session to address fire-related policies such as forest management, vegetation management near utility equipment, utility liability and residential property insurance.

Senate President pro Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) and Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood) have recently convened a 10-member joint conference committee to work on the complex issues related to wildfires.

The committee comprises the following members:

- Co-Chair: Assembly Member Chris Holden (D-Pasadena)
- Sen. Anthony Cannella (R-Ceres)
- Sen. Ben Hueso (D-San Diego)
- Sen. Hannah-Beth Jackson (D-Santa Barbara)
- Sen. Jeff Stone (R-Riverside County)
- Assembly Member Brian Dahle (R-Bieber)
- Assembly Member Chad Mayes (R-Yucca Valley)
- Assembly Member Eloise Gomez Reyes (D-San Bernardino)
- Assembly Member Jim Wood (D-Healdsburg)

League members have also been discussing various aspects of wildfire response all year. Recently, several League policy committees and the Board of Directors have adopted policy regarding funding for fire response and pre-positioning, transparent residential insurance policies, protecting cities from additional liability risks and insurance that ensures residents have the ability to rebuild after a fire.

The Legislature is on summer recess for the rest of the month. They will return for a final four-week stretch before adjourning the 2018 legislative session at the end of August. Any proposals made by this conference committee or the administration would have to be heard and voted on by Aug. 31.
